First Sunday of Advent December 1, 2024

FOCUS: Prepare for the coming of the Lord.

As we begin Advent, our readings today offer wisdom in discerning what it means to prepare our hearts for the Lord. They are beckoning us to wake up and be attentive to what is around us, for God's time is at hand. We have the blessing of this season to prepare for the coming of the Lord, and to allow our hearts to be transformed.

THE WAITING TIME FR. JOSEPH JUKNIALIS

Advent is a time of hope but also a time of waiting. Different than wishing, hope is the belief that, one day, all will be well. Teenagers eagerly wait to be out on their own, believing then all will be well. Students are eager to graduate and get away from papers to write, books to read, and exams to take—then all will be well. Some singles long to find a partner, marry, and settle down, believing—then—all will be well. Always there is the faith that, although life may not now be what we wish, the future will bring a time when all will be well. We are inveterate people of hope. Yet life is a process that cannot be rushed.

Author Annie Dillard once watched a butterfly hatch from a cocoon. A bit impatient, she decided to gently warm the cocoon and so hasten the process. It worked, except by rushing the process the butterfly's wings were undeveloped, too weak to fly. All that we hope and long for in life must happen at its own pace, faithful to the process. How, then, do we negotiate the waiting? The Gospel's encouragement is to pray, but not for what we want. Rather, we are to pray for the strength to stand with hope before the Son of Man, trusting that God will bring forth the goodness we need. Though it may be different than what we seek, it will be what we need.

Reflect: How can you better enjoy times of waiting?

PARISH COUNCIL, **LITURGY MEMBERS, AND** COUNCIL OF MINISTRIES




Members of our Parish Council, Council of Ministries, and Liturgy Committee

Dear Padre, December 1, 2024

I've been Catholic all my life, but I don't understand Advent. It's too much like Lent and seems an odd way to prepare for the birth of a baby.

In a society that is primarily secular, one skill of the believing Christian is the ability to balance competing realities. From a secular perspective, Christmas is part of the period identified as the "holidays," beginning with Thanksgiving until New Year's Day, when it abruptly ends and stores begin advertising Valentine's Day. For Christians, Christmas is the day we celebrate the birth of Jesus, the great promise fulfilled after centuries of waiting and expectation. The creative energy of the Father is displayed in wonder and awe as the angels sing and people of good faith gather to celebrate. We join our ancestors in anticipation of this event through the liturgical season of Advent, a time of waiting and preparation. The Christian holy day is a singular day, the feast of the Nativity of the Lord—Christmas—but the Church continues the celebration of God's life and love through the days that follow, culminating in the Baptism of the Lord, the beginning of the public ministry of Jesus. We are invited to hold the secular and the liturgical experiences in an integrated balance. We can celebrate the secular holidays and we can enter the liturgical season that helps us contemplate something much grander and more spectacular.

FEASTS & SAINTS OF THE WEEK



St. Francis Xavier - Feast Day is December 3rd. This 16th c. saint cofounded the Society of Jesus (Jesuits) and is considered the greatest Catholic missionary of modern times. He was instrumental in establishing Christianity in India, the Malay Archipelago, and Japan. His great zeal for the Faith led to his desire to be Christ's disciple in service to God by carrying the Faith to those in distant lands. He served with great humility and gave his time to others. It's been said that he baptized some 30,000 to Christianity during his lifetime, which is more than anyone else since St. Paul. Pope Pius XI declared him as the Patron of Catholic Missions.



St. Nicholas – Feast Day is December 6th. This 3rd – 4th c. saint of Greek descent from modern day Turkey was known by such titles as: St. Nicholas of Myra, Nicholas of Bari, and Nicholas the Wonderworker. He became a bishop during the time of the Roman Empire. Many miracles have been attributed to him including bringing children back to life and saving sailors from death. He was admired for his generosity, piety, and kindness especially to the poor and sick after giving away his inherited wealth. Over time, news of his charity and giving spread, which led to

the idea of giving gifts secretly to others. Devotion to him grew and extended to all parts of Europe. This led to our modern-day notion of Santa Claus, as people took the concept of gift giving with them. He's the patron saint of merchants, sailors, prisoners, and children.



St. Ambrose - Feast Day is December 7th. A 4th c. theologian and statesman from Gaul (present day Germany), he was one of the most theological figures of that time and one of the four original Doctors of the Church. He was significant in the ways he followed Christ and gave his life in service to the Church. He's noted for fiercely promoting Roman Christianity against Arianism and paganism. He was the Bishop of Milan for 23 years and was also known for teaching the importance of prayer and being merciful. We are inspired to spend time in prayer and meditation each day, such as reading Sacred Scripture, so we can be

filled with mercy and be vessels of mercy to others. His feast day marks the anniversary of his consecration as a bishop.
