Contact coordinator.


MARRIAGE: Notify the parish 6 months prior to proposed date. Attending an Engaged Encounter Weekend is required prior to marriage ceremony.

LIFE AT THE EDGE

FR. JOSEPH JUKNIALIS

We find ourselves living at the edge sometimes, when life could go either way, up or down. We may experience this as we begin marriage or first become parents. At other times, it may be frightening or sad, but also exciting, such as when graduation nears, or when we are faced with an "empty nest." Then, we stand at the edge of a new beginning, eager for the onset of what we've dreamt of for so long, but also uncertain whether we will be able to navigate it.

We also find ourselves living at the edge when someone we love dies. The other day, someone came by, wanting to talk. She spoke of the chaos of her life, its pain, and of not knowing how to cope. As she was about to leave, she commented how, in spite of it all, it seemed strange that God was also very much present. Strange indeed, yet chaotic times are when God's presence is often perceived in our lives, perhaps out of our need, perhaps because we are not distracted by life's glitter, or perhaps because, at last, we have nowhere else to turn.

It was St. James who asked then and asks us now, "Did not God choose those who are poor in the world to be rich in faith?" (James 2:5). There are indeed many different ways of being poor, of being in need. For people of faith, it is often at the edge when we sense most clearly that God is with us.

Reflect: Do you feel God's presence differently in hard times than you do in easy times?

Dear Padre,

What is the "gospel of prosperity"? Does it mean that being rich is a sign of God's favor?

That's a good question, as this month we listen to the challenging words of St. James. If there is a "gospel of prosperity," Matthew, Mark, Luke, or John didn't write it, and it isn't about Jesus. If anything, the Gospels would be called "Gospels of poverty." Jesus himself was born in poverty. Had he wished to extol riches and prosperity, he would have been born into the lap of luxury. But God chose the poverty of a stable. Although the subject of riches and poverty appears in all the Gospels, Luke writes about it the most. It is thought that Luke was concerned about this topic because he came from wealth and dealt with people of means. Luke sees money and goods as dangerous to salvation. Although "nothing will be impossible for God" (Luke 1:37), Luke uses the image of a camel passing through the eye of a needle to explain that this impossible task is easier than for a rich person to enter the kingdom of heaven (Luke 18:25). Scary words. Yet, poverty itself is not hailed as good, nor are riches condemned in themselves. It's what wealth does to people that is the core issue. When we focus on riches and possessions, we risk turning from God and growing deaf to the cries of the poor. Possessions and wealth are to be shared, not hoarded.

FEASTS & SAINTS OF THE WEEK



St. Peter Claver - Feast Day is September 9th. He was a 17th c. Spanish Jesuit priest and missionary, who was born in Spain, but left his homeland forever in 1610 to minister to African slaves in the New World. He devoted his life to serving African slaves in Columbia for 38 years and baptized over 300,000 of them. He earned the title of "Apostle of the Negroes" by working unceasingly for their salvation and abolition of the Negro slave trade. His first concern though was to erase their human suffering and restore a sense of dignity. His life of humility and penance led to miraculous occurrences. He's the patron saint of slaves, the Republic of Columbia, African missions, and interracial justice.

Most Holy Name of Mar - Feast Day is September 12th. This special feast to honor our Blessed Mother began in Spain in 1513. It commemorates her Holy Name and is a day when we recall the inexpressible love of Mother Mary for her Child, Jesus and how the faithful are directed to invoke her with devotion. Some churches celebrate this feast with processions to honor her holy name and the contributions she's made to the church. Many people, however, choose to pray the Rosary. It's interesting that even though her name is simple, she has numerous titles attributed to her. This is the patronal feast of the Society of Mary (Marianists).





Exaltation of the Holy Cross -Feast Day is September 14th. This feast, also known as "Triumph of the Cross," commemorates the miraculous discovery in 326 of the True Cross by St. Helen, mother of Emperor Constantine, while she was on a pilgrimage to Jerusalem. The significance of this feast is to honor the cross on which Christ was crucified. It also represents Christ's victory over death and redemptive transformation of a torture instrument into a divine "tree of life," which brings hope to mankind. Constantine had a church built on this site where the cross was discovered, known as the Church of the Holy Sepulchre, which is considered to be the holiest and most important pilgrimage site in Christianity.
