FAITH FORMATION (CCD & OCIA): Contact coordinator.


MARRIAGE: Notify the parish 6 months prior to proposed date. Attending an Engaged Encounter Weekend is required prior to marriage ceremony.

## COMING HOME FR. JOSEPH JUKNIALIS

Coming home can take place in many varied ways. Sometimes it's at the end of a long day when we come home to where we can be ourselves without any pretentions. Sometimes it's going back to the neighborhood we grew up in, to the old haunts that remind us of the dreams we had and how they now seem tucked in every niche. Sometimes coming home is what happens after many wanderings, after we've sown our oats and harvested little and now have nowhere else to go. That too is a coming home, back to where it all began, back to where we dare to hope that life might begin again.

All of this is how the Hebrew people found themselves coming home to Jerusalem after eighty years of exile, coming back to start anew with the hope that their God would once again be proud of them, back to where they could be as God intended them to be. All of that is what we do when we decide we will try to be the sort of person we'd always hoped to become. It's when we attempt a second effort at making a marriage work, or a job productive, or maybe simply putting the pieces of our lives back in some sort of order. It's all about coming back home to God's dream for us, a kind of second Advent, when God comes into our lives and is born once again.

#### Reflect: Have you wandered too far from the values of your true home? Can you find your way back?



## Dear Padre,

# If Christmas is on December 25, why is the Immaculate Conception on December 8, rather than sometime in March?

The doctrine of the Immaculate Conception asserts that Mary was free of the stain of original sin from the time she was conceived in her mother's womb. Jesus was also free of the stain of original sin and his conception by Mary is referred to as the Incarnation of Christ. Mary's Immaculate Conception is often confused for Christ's Incarnation. In the Church's liturgical calendar, Mary's conception is celebrated on December 8; her birthday is celebrated exactly nine months later on September 8. Likewise, Christ's conception is celebrated on March 25 on the Solemnity of the Annunciation of the Lord; his birthday is celebrated exactly nine months later on December 25. Mary's Immaculate Conception was celebrated many centuries before Pope Pius IX defined it as dogma on December 8, 1854: "The doctrine that maintains that the Blessed Virgin Mary in the first instant of her conception, by a unique grace and privilege granted to her by Almighty God, in consideration of the merits of Jesus Christ the Savior of mankind, was preserved free from all stain of original sin, is a doctrine revealed by God and therefore must be firmly and constantly believed by all the faithful" (Ineffabilis Deus). In fact, eight years before, in 1846, the bishops of the United States had already adopted the Immaculate Conception as the patronal feast for Catholics in this country.

### FEASTS & SAINTS OF THE WEEK

<u>Our Lady of Guadalupe</u> – Feast Day is December 12th. Also known as the "Virgin of Guadalupe," this feast commemorates a series of four apparitions to Mexican Aztec peasant, Juan Diego, from Dec. 9-12, 1531. Unlike any other vision of the Blessed Virgin Mary, this special day holds profound cultural significance, particularly in Mexico and among the indigenous peoples of the Americas. When Our Lady appeared to Juan Diego, she introduced herself as the Mother of God and Mother of all Humanity. She asked him to have a shrine

built on this exact spot to show and share her love and compassion with all those who believe. The Basilica of Our Lady of Guadalupe stands there in her honor at the foot of Tepeyac Hill in Mexico. This feast is one of the most popular religious devotions in Mexico. She's the Patroness of the Americas, unborn children, and the New Evangelization.



<u>St. Lucy</u> - Feast Day is December 13th. This 3rd c. virgin and martyr was one of the best known of the earliest saints, who achieved popularity in Europe during the Roman Empire. Born in Syracuse, Sicily, she was also known as St. Lucia, who dedicated her virginity to God and desired to serve the poor. She's venerated in parts of Europe such as Sweden, where ceremonies mark St. Lucia's day and the festival brings hope and light during the darkest time of the year. She's also revered in the Philippines with a novena before her

feast day with processions, hymns, Masses, and festivals. She was martyred when she refused to marry a suiter, who accused her of being a Christian. Before being finally executed by a sword in her neck, her eyes were gouged out and she's often depicted in medieval art holding a dish with her eyes on it. This patron of sight is one of eight women commemorated during the Canon of the Mass.



**<u>St. John of the Cross</u>** - Feast Day is December 14th. This 16th c. Catholic priest, mystic, and Carmelite friar was also a theologian, a major figure of the Counter-Reformation in Spain, and one of the 37 Doctors of the Church. He was best known for his writings, having been mentored by Carmelite, Teresa of Avila, and then corresponded with her. He was one of the foremost poets in Spain and his works, particularly the "Dark Night of the Soul" and "Spiritual

Canticle" are considered masterpieces of Spanish poetry with its formal style and rich symbolism and imagery. Having known the Cross extremely, he experienced the dying of Jesus as he sat in his dark, damp, narrow cell months after months with only his God with him. He was truly "of the Cross" by conveying the message of losing one's life if a person wants to save it. He's the patron of Spanish poets, mystics, and contemplatives.
