
MARRIAGE: Notify the parish 6 months prior to proposed date. Attending an Engaged Encounter Weekend is required prior to marriage ceremony.

As human beings, we have a sense that by ourselves, we are incomplete. We long to be made whole, to unite with something more. We have glimmers of that wholeness when we fall in love, opening ourselves to another in complete and total surrender. We feel touched by it when we experience great beauty in art, music, and creation. We may also find that wholeness in times of prayer. Yet in all such moments, there is a hint of sadness knowing that it will not last, that we will once again ache for more from life. All such longings are part of the human condition. It is how we have been created from the very beginning, always seeking to be made whole. The American poet Sara Teasdale wrote in one of her poems that "the heart asks more than life can give." That seems to be true in so many aspects of life. As often as married couples may feel united in their love, they may also expect the other person to fulfill and satisfy that need of wholeness at all times and circumstances. However, that is not possible, and so they may find themselves disappointed. Whether in marriage, friendship, or the bonds of family, love always asks for more than life is able to give. We will always hunger for more, simply because that very hunger flows from God, the only one who will ultimately satisfy it.

Why do we say "Holy Mary, Mother of God" when she's the mother of Jesus?

The first Christians did call Mary the "Mother of Jesus." The title "Mother of God" wasn't formally defined in the Church's history until the First Council of Ephesus in 431. Around the year 250, the hymn Sub Tuum Presidium ("We Fly to Thy Patronage") appeared, which refers to Mary as the Mother of God. Why did it take so long for the early Church to decide how to refer to Jesus' Mother? What we call Mary is tied to how we understand Jesus' identity as the fully human and fully divine Son of God. The Church understood Jesus as a person of the Trinity, the Son of God, who uniquely possesses both fully human and fully divine natures. In a nutshell, you can't separate the "man" Jesus from the "God" Jesus. In clarifying what it meant to say that Jesus is the Son of God, equally one with the Father and the Holy Spirit and yet fully human and "like us in all things but sin," the Church had to answer the question of how Mary fit into the work of salvation. Mary was the Mother of the Son of God; she was not only the Mother of Jesus' human nature. When Catholics call Mary the "Mother of God," they state their belief that Jesus is a single person—the Son of God—and that Mary is his Mother.

FEASTS & SAINTS OF THE WEEK



<u>Our Lady of the Rosary</u> - Feast Day is October 7th. Formerly known as the Feast of "Our Lady of Victory," St. Pius V established this memorial to thank God for the Christian naval defeat of the Turks at the Battle of Lepanto (near Greece) in 1571. This victory was attributed to the praying of the rosary. Pope Gregory XIII changed the name of this feast in 1573 to the "Feast of our Lady of the Rosary" and it was originally celebrated on the 1st Sunday in October. St. Pius X set the date to October 7th in 1913, which marked the Battle of Lepanto. By praying the rosary, we encounter Mary and become closer to Jesus through the mysteries. Our Lady provides special protection, love, and many graces to those who recite the rosary, which is a powerful armor against hell and can destroy vices, decrease sin, and defeat heresies.

St. Denis - Feast Day is October 9th. He was a 3rd c. Italian-born martyr, who was the first bishop of Paris and has been regarded as the patron saint of France. St. Denis was sent from Rome to Gaul to convert the people and was martyred in Montmartre (Mountain of martyrs) in Paris along with two companions by beheading in the persecution under Emperor Valerius in 258. According to legend with some details suggesting facts, this decapitated bishop accompanied by angels, picked up his head and walked several miles while preaching a sermon on repentance. He finally collapsed and died when he reached his chosen burial site at a village northeast of Paris. Later, a church was built there on the spot. His courageous death proved his victory of faith over persecution and death.





St. John XXIII - Feast Day is October 11th. One of the most notable popes of the 20th c. from 1958 - 1963, he was best known for his convening of the Second Vatican Council. He's also regarded as one of the most popular popes in history and was an energetic advocate of world peace. Pope Francis canonized him in 2014 along with Pope John Paul II and bypassed the necessity of a second miracle due to his virtuous model lifestyle and the good that came from his opening of the Second Vatican Council. He's been regarded as the "Good Pope" for his benevolence as a man. His motto was "Obedience and Peace." He taught us what it meant to

have a holy life, which he surely demonstrated, and he exhibited primarily the virtues of faith and hope. He's the patron saint of papal delegates and the Second Vatican Council.
