Centering Prayer

Come pray with us in **Centering Prayer/*Lectio Divina**. We start with the Angelus, then sing a short song. After, there is the reading of the Gospel for Sunday, 20 minutes of quiet time, and sharing on the Gospel. **We meet every Wednesday in church from 5pm to 6pm.** *Lectio Divina is reading the scripture prayerfully. If you want to listen to the Lord instead of talking, this prayer may be for you.

I hear people talking about finding their vocation. How do I know what my vocation is?

Our Catholic understanding of vocation is “a call from God to a particular state in life,” by which is usually meant single, married, priest, or religious. When you hear people speaking about finding their vocation, it is possible that this is what they have in mind. On the other hand, it is also quite possible that they are referring simply to a particular occupation that they feel comfortable with and wish to pursue.

The root understanding of *vocation* is really the understanding of God’s call and our response. Vocation has not so much to do with what we do but is rather reflective of what we believe about our relationship with God. Vocation assumes that we believe that God is active in our own unique history and is involved in our decision-making process; that God desires to manifest his will to us; and that God does in fact communicate with us in a very personal way.

If you are truly open to the will of God in your own life, if you are willing to listen to God’s call and make your decisions and choices based on this experience, preferably with the guidance of a confessor or spiritual director, you will discover the true happiness that a real vocation can bring.

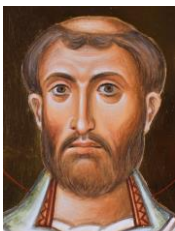

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Feasts and Saints of the Week



St. Augustine of Canterbury - Feast Day is May 27th. He was a 6th c. Christian monk, who followed the rule of St. Benedict and became a missionary and Apostle to the English. Pope Gregory the Great chose him to lead a mission from Rome to England to bring Christianity to the pagan Anglo-Saxons. He was able to convert the king, get his support, and succeed in converting the people. He became the first Archbishop of Canterbury and established one of medieval England's most important abbeys, St. Augustine's Abbey in Canterbury, where he is buried. He is notably the patron saint of England.

St. Paul VI - Feast Day is May 29th. This 20th c. pope reigned from 1963-1978 and is considered the patron saint of Vatican Council II and the Archdiocese of Milan. He succeeded Pope St. John XXIII and is noted for continuing the Second Vatican Council until its closure in 1965 and putting its numerous reforms into effect. He's also responsible for improving ecumenical relations with Eastern Orthodox and Protestant churches and was the first pope in over a century to leave Italy and travel to other parts of the world. He was considered one of the most progressive popes in church history, whose focus was on social justice, unity of all people, and peace.



The Feast of the Visitation of the Blessed Virgin Mary - Feast Day is May 31st. This joyful feast commemorates the visit of the Virgin Mary to her cousin, Elizabeth, following the Annunciation of our Lord and preceding the birth of St. John the Baptist. It was actually a feast of medieval origin and was kept by the Franciscan order before the 13th c. spread throughout the entire church. It marks an important event in Salvation History with Elizabeth's praise to God for giving Mary as the Mother of our Lord and to Mary who trusts God's words. It also celebrates the meeting of their unborn children and highlights the Hail Mary and Magnificat prayers. This is the earliest church devotion to Mary and since 1969, has appropriately been given this fixed feast date.
