Home Modification Services & Assistance for Seniors

Through a grant from the Teresa F. Hughes Trust, St. Francis Healthcare System is offering families minor home modification services and assistance to seniors who are age 70 years and older at no cost. You can receive:

- Grab bars for bathrooms and showers;
- Night lights for better hallway lighting during the night;
- ADA-compliant toilets to help seniors more easily get on and off a toilet on their own;
- Assistive devices such as canes, walkers and wheelchairs; and
- Housekeeping services that enhance mobility and improve indoor and outdoor safety at home.

To qualify one must be a Hawaii resident, 70 years or older, have a medical or disabling condition, need assistance with daily living but can still live safely in a community setting, and demonstrate financial need. The maximum allowable spend per person is up to \$500.

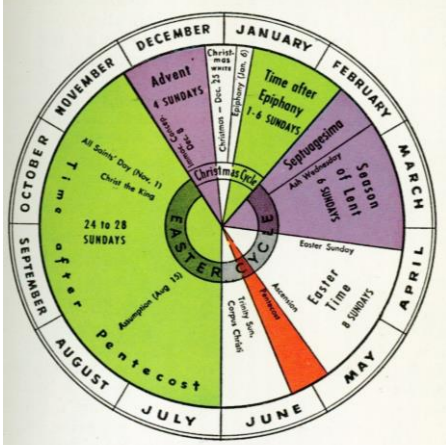

What is Ordinary Time?



Simply put, Ordinary Time refers to all those parts of the Liturgical Year that aren't included in the major seasons of: *Advent, Christmas, Lent, and Easter*. Ordinary Time is called "ordinary" not because it is common but because the weeks of Ordinary Time are numbered. The Latin word *ordinalis*, which refers to numbers in a series, stems from the Latin word *ordo*, from which we get the English word *order*. Thus, the numbered weeks of Ordinary Time, in fact, represent the ordered life of the Church – the period in which we live our lives neither in feasting (as in the Christmas and Easter seasons) or in more severe penance (as in Advent and Lent), but in watchfulness and expectation of the Second Coming of Christ. For us Catholics, Ordinary Time is the part of the year in which Christ, the Lamb of God, walks among us and transforms our lives. There's nothing "ordinary" about that.

The normal liturgical color for Ordinary Time is **green**. Green vestments and altar cloths have traditionally been associated with the time after Pentecost, the period in which the Church founded by the risen Christ and enlivened by the Holy Spirit began to grow and to spread the Gospel to all the nations.

Ordinary Time is a feature of the current (post–Vatican II) liturgical calendar. The Sundays of Ordinary Time are referred to as the Sundays After Epiphany until the First Sunday of Lent and then the Sundays After Pentecost until the First Sunday of Advent.

In any given year, there are 33-34 Sundays in Ordinary Time. Because Easter is a movable feast, and thus the Lent and Easter seasons "float" from year to year, the number of Sundays in each period of Ordinary Time vary from the other period as well as from year to year.
