WHEN WORLDS COLLAPSE FR. JOSEPH JUKNIALIS

When personal worlds collapse, we can lose our way. The stars that marked our path through life disappear. When everything in life on which we had depended is shaken, we can feel life is not worth living. It happens when someone we love dies, when life-threatening illness lays us low, when a relationship disintegrates without warning. Then the world we once knew is no more. This week's Gospel suggests "when you see these things happening, know that he is near, at the gates" (Mark 13:29). But how can that be?

I met Marguerite and Ken when I came to the parish. A short time later, I received a phone call that Ken had suffered a massive heart attack. He had gone down to the basement for something, and that was where he died. I spent some time with Marguerite, and as you can imagine, she was wrapped in grief. They'd had a wonderful marriage, she told me, had done everything together. Whatever one did, the other went along. Two years later, Marguerite and I were talking and she began telling me how life had changed for her without Ken. She still missed him terribly. But lately she found herself involved in all sorts of parish activities and services she never would have gotten into, simply because they had always done things together. Without Ken, she found new worlds she never knew existed. For Marguerite, God had opened the gates to new life.

Dear Padre,

I am confused by Genesis 6:6: "The LORD regretted making human beings on the earth, and his heart was grieved." How can a perfect being regret something he created in his own image?

Sometimes reading an isolated line of Scripture can be confusing. Context is essential. The Second Vatican Council's Dogmatic Constitution on Divine Revelation (Dei Verbum), promulgated by Pope St. Paul VI on November 18, 1965, clearly teaches this Catholic understanding of sacred Scripture. A proper appreciation of context, in the example you provided, reminds us that the holy writers of Scripture were not reporting the words of the Lord like an announcer on the evening news. This is not a newspaper account of a witnessed event or a report commenting on the scene that has unfolded. Biblical authors were constrained by their own experience and perception, even as they were inspired by the Spirit of God. When they made a conclusion, they frequently revealed more about their humanity than they did about the divinity they witnessed. The divine is just too wonderful and mysterious for humans to fully comprehend. The author of Genesis provided a summary of how the experience of the creative activity of God was perceived. It is not the whole story and is perhaps best understood more as a contrast with Genesis 1:31, where we read that on the sixth day, "God looked at everything he had made, and found it very good."

FEASTS & SAINTS OF THE WEEK

St. Rose Philippine Duchesne – Feast Day is November 18th. This 19th c. French religious sister and educator founded the first convents of the Society of the Sacred Heart in the U.S. She traveled from her home in France to the U.S. as a missionary, where she founded many schools, did charitable work such as caring for the sick even those with repulsive wounds and ministered with dedication to the Potawatomi Native Americans. She often obtained miraculous cures for people whom she cared for from the Child Jesus. The last half of her life was spent teaching and serving the people in the Midwestern U.S., which was considered the Western frontier at that time.

She died in St. Charles, Missouri at the age of 83 and was canonized by Pope John Paul II in 1988.



The Presentation of the Blessed Virgin Mary- Feast Day is November 21st. This feast, which was celebrated in Jerusalem in the 6th c. in the Eastern Church and then in the 11th c. in the Western Church, became a liturgical feast of the Universal Church in the 16th c. Mary's parents, Anna and Joachim, presented their 3 yr. old daughter to God in the Temple of

Jerusalem to fulfill a promise to God. Anna had prayed for a child, received a heavenly message that she would bear one, and then promised that she would dedicate her to God's service. This feast emphasizes Mary's holiness received from the beginning of her life, which continued through her childhood and beyond. She was truly dedicated to God and became a temple of the Lord dwelling in her in a special way and sanctifying her for her unique role in his saving work.



<u>St. Cecilia</u> - Feast Day is November 22nd. She was a 3rd c. Roman virgin martyr, who was one of the most famous ones of the early church. She's the patron saint of music and musicians and has been the patron saint of church music since the 16th c. She is said to have heard heavenly music inside her heart, when she was forced to marry Valerian who was a pagan, but was later converted. She's noted for her trust in the Lord's plan and how to be fearless in the face of death. She converted others as well by introducing them to God. Her motto was "to praise, to bless, and to preach." She was known to have appeared in some apparitions

to St. Dominic with the Blessed Virgin Mary. She showed strength and devotion and is often depicted with a harp. A church was built over her house where she lived and died.
