



Dear Padre,

Are naked statues, like Michelangelo's David, really appropriate for public viewing?

It is helpful to consider if the artwork depicts the body to heighten transcendence, or to objectify the body to satisfy basic instincts. Art is admittedly subjective, and the interpretation of nudity in true art is in the eye of the beholder. Nudity can evoke feelings of shame for some; for others, the nude body in art can be an aesthetic experience of illuminated grace in humanity, and ultimately in the glory of our Maker for all his gifts—including the gift of Christ's resurrection that restored us to the original image and likeness intended by our Creator.

Since ancient times, the nude human form was a common subject in art. The intention is to draw the viewer to a better appreciation of the human body's natural beauty. However, nudity is often associated with sexuality, and for some, sexuality is equated with sin.

In his series of addresses about the theology of the body, St. John Paul II expounded on original nakedness that was referred to in Scripture: "Man tries to cover the real origin of fear with the shame of his own nakedness" (Genesis 3:10). "In the state of original innocence nakedness did not express a lack. Rather, it represented full acceptance of the body..." (*Real Significance of Original Nakedness*, 1980).

So to answer the question, assuming the purpose of the artist is to inspire, and the atmosphere in which the statue is viewed is conducive to such inspiration, yes, such a public display is appropriate. • Fr. Byron Miller, CSsR / DearPadre.org

Feasts and Saints of the Week



<u>St. John Eudes</u> - Feast Day is August 19th. A 17th c. French priest, he was noted for being a parish missionary and founder of two religious communities. He was a great promoter of devotion to the Sacred Heart of Jesus and the Immaculate Heart of Mary. The central theme of his writings was Jesus as the source of holiness and Mary as the model of Christian life. He was also concerned with spiritual improvement of the clergy and seminarian formation. During severe plagues, he even volunteered to take care of those who were stricken in his diocese and lived apart from his community in a barrel in a field, so he wouldn't spread the disease. He's the patron saint of missionaries and the Congregation of Jesus and Mary.



The Queenship of the Blessed Virgin Mary - Feast Day is August 22nd. The importance of this feast is that it represents the life of Mary, who is body and soul in heaven and was the first one to share fully in the redemption of Christ as his mother. Since her Divine Son is King, she reigns as Queen (in ancient Israel, it was the king's mother who reigned instead of the king's wife). Pope Pius XII established this feast in 1954 after declaring the dogma of the Assumption of Mary into heaven. This memorial is considered a prolongation of the celebration of the Assumption, which is eight days earlier. We can celebrate her queenship by praying the "Hail Holy Queen" or the "Magnificat" on this day.



St. Rose of Lima - Feast Day is August 23rd. She was a 17th c. member of the Third Order of St. Dominic in Lima, Peru. She was known especially for her extreme piety, severe asceticism, care of the needy, deep faith, and complete devotion to God. Miraculous healings have been attributed to her during her lifetime and after her death. One legend states that after her death, all of Lima smelled of roses that fell from the sky. She also practiced heroic charity. Being very beautiful, she refused to marry and helped her family by doing needlework and growing flowers. She inspires us today as a model of doing small, wonderful things with great love. She's the patron saint of embroiderers, gardeners, and florists as well as of the indigenous peoples of the Americas, Peru, India, and the Philippines.
