22nd Sunday in Ordinary Time September 1, 2024

FOCUS: Jesus teaches us to keep our focus on obeying God's commandments. Like the Pharisees in today's Gospel, we can get caught up in our traditions, questioning and arguing with those who do things differently or want to change our ways. Jesus offers a reminder to not lose sight of what is truly important: obeying God's commandments and keeping our hearts and actions pure.

ONE FOR ALL AND ALL FOR ONE

One day, I asked the eighth graders I was teaching to imagine themselves on a fantasy journey. They had to pretend they were flying across the ocean in a small airplane when suddenly the plane has engine trouble. The pilot manages to land on a sandy island beach. Everyone survives, but a few passengers are injured. The captain divides the passengers into groups, each with a specific task. One group is responsible for finding food; another for water; another to explore and map the island; another to care for the injured. After explaining the scenario, I divided the eighth graders into groups of four or five to complete the same "pretend" tasks—to create a set of rules by which to live until they were all rescued. The rules each group created were much the same: share everything, no hoarding, no fighting, obey the captain, no stealing, those who do not work do not eat. In effect, these eighth graders created their own "commandments," enabling the community to survive in its own kind of desert, likely in the same way the Ten Commandments helped the Israelites.

The teachings of Jesus do not abrogate the original Ten Commandments. They continue to hold a great deal of wisdom for surviving as a community. Jesus taught us to focus on how our behavior shapes the sort of individuals we become and, ultimately, what sort of community we form. What flows from one's heart, Jesus taught, reveals who we are both alone and in community.

Reflection: What would you include in a set of rules for yourself and your family?

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Dear Padre,

Do Christians need to follow the Ten Commandments, or are they the "Old Law"?

There is nothing arbitrary or old-fashioned about the commandments of God. The Ten Commandments, given to us by the Author of the World, are found in Exodus 20:2–17. They are: (1) I, the Lord, am your God. You shall not have other gods besides me. (2) You shall not take the name of the Lord, your God, in vain. (3) Remember to keep holy the Lord's day. (4) Honor your father and your mother. (5) You shall not kill. (6) You shall not commit adultery. (7) You shall not steal. (8) You shall not bear false witness against your neighbor. (9) You shall not covet your neighbor's wife. (10) You shall not covet your neighbor's goods.

The first three Commandments were meant to guide us in our relationship with God; the remaining seven Commandments pertain to our relationships with others. Jesus gives us a new motivation for keeping the Commandments —the motivation of love. He gives a double commandment: love of God and love of neighbor (Mark 12:28–34). Saint Paul tells us these new commands fulfill those of the Old Law (Romans 13:8–10); and John writes that keeping the Commandments simply out of fear of punishment is not enough: love must be the driving force (1 John 4:18).

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A word from POPE FRANCIS

We spend time assigning blame; but spending time blaming others is wasting time. We become angry, bitter, and keep God away from our heart....One cannot be truly religious while complaining: complaining poisons, it leads you to anger, to resentment and to sadness...which closes the door to God. Let us ask the Lord today to free us from blaming others....



FEASTS & SAINTS OF THE WEEK



St. Giles - Feast Day is September 1st. A 7th c. Greek saint, he was also known as Giles the Hermit. He was a priest and then became an abbot of a monastery and was active as a hermit or monk in the lower Rhone area in southern France. His cult was spread widely though. The town of St. Gilles-du-Gard, named after after him, grew up around the monastery he founded, which became a pilgrimage center and center of his cult. Many miracles have been attributed to his intercession in life and at his tomb. He withdrew deep into a forest near Nimes, France, where he spent many years in solitude with his beloved deer, who was his sole companion and sustained him on her milk. He's the patron saint of breastfeeding and of people with disabilities.

St. Gregory the Great - Feast Day is September 3rd. Also known as Pope Gregory I, he was the 64th Bishop of Rome from 590-604. He was the founder of the medieval papacy and is regarded as one of its greatest popes. He was originally a Benedictine monk before becoming a priest and later being elected pope at age 50. He is best known for his contributions to the liturgy, such as reforming the Mass and daily prayer of the Church and writing prayers still used today. He's also noted for promoting the use of Gregorian Chant in the Church and thus is the patron saint of musicians and singers. Being direct and firm, he restored order within the church, such as removing unworthy priests from office, making peace with invading Lombards, and extending tolerance to Jews.





St. Teresa of Kolkata - Feast Day is September 5th. Also known as Mother Teresa, she was a 20th c. Albanian-born Indian missionary and nun, who founded the Order of the Missionaries of Charity. Having lived most of her life in India, she was noted for her dedication to helping those most in need by ministering to the poor, sick, orphaned, destitute, and dying in India for over 45 years. She received over 120 honors and awards, including the 1979 Nobel Peace Prize. She was a beautiful witness of the mystery of suffering with Christ joyfully. She's the patron saint of World Youth Day, the Missionaries of Charity, and co-patron of the Archdiocese of Calcutta as well as the universal symbol of God's merciful and preferential love for the poor and forgotten.
