32nd Sunday in Ordinary Time November 10, 2024

Our readings today feature two widows who teach us about faithfulness. To have faith is not just to hold our breath and aimlessly wish for good outcomes. Rather, God calls us to a faith that is endless trust in him, knowing in our deepest heart that God loves and cares for us beyond measure.

Many years ago, I spent a summer in rural Mississippi living and sharing life with the folks of that area. Annie lived on a hillside in the "hollers" of that part of the country. In many ways, she reminded me of Granny from TV's The Beverly Hillbillies. Annie was thin and wiry, wore bib overalls, climbed barbed wire fences, swore like a trooper, and raised a henhouse of chickens in her backyard. I once asked her what she did with all the eggs she gathered, whether she sold them to make a little money for a rainy day. She said to me, "Lord, no. I give them away, and then when I need something, they give to me. That's the way we live." Her generosity embarrassed me, for she lived with trust like the widows in today's two Scripture readings, giving from their want and their need and finding God taking care of them.

When our day is stretched beyond the time we need, and we choose to share what little time we have with someone who needs our help, somehow our day works itself out. When someone comes in need of love, and we sense we have not even enough to care for ourselves, but still we reach out, we find there is enough love for them and for us. Whenever we give from our want, it always seems God is present amid the trust that all will be well.

TV's "The Chosen" portrays St. Peter as married. What does the Catholic Church say about this?

Scripture gives evidence about earliest Church practice when it says bishops, presbyters (priests), and deacons should be "married only once" (see 1 Timothy 3:2, 12). That means some of them must have been married! Still, the discipline of celibacy for the sake of the kingdom was encouraged from apostolic times as a way to follow the example of Christ. In the 300s, decrees concerning celibacy of the clergy indicate it was becoming the norm. Peter is the most frequently mentioned disciple of Jesus in all four Gospels. This Galilean fisherman—introduced to Jesus by his brother, Andrew (see John 1:40–42)—became a spokesman and fi gure of central importance among the other Apostles. Of the Twelve, some, like Peter, were married. His wife was from Capernaum and their family household may have included his in-laws. According to Scripture, "Jesus entered the house of Peter and saw his mother-in-law lying in bed with a fever. He touched her hand, the fever left her, and she rose and waited on him" (Matthew 8:14–15; see also Mark 1:30–31 and Luke 4:38–39). Moreover, Jesus—who may never have owned a home of his own—made the house of Peter his headquarters when he ministered in Capernaum (see Matthew 4:12–13). This house of Peter and his family was venerated by early Christians. Today, the Church of St. Peter's House sits over the original dwelling.

FEASTS & SAINTS OF THE WEEK



St. Martin of Tours - Feast Day is November 11th. Also known as "Martin the Merciful," this 4th c. saint was born in Hungary, but ministered and died in France. Born into a pagan family, he was attracted to Christianity and became a Christian at the age of 18. After serving as a soldier in the Roman army, he changed course and decided to be "Christ's soldier." He became a monk and later was chosen by the people of Tours as their spiritual leader and then was appointed as the 3rd bishop there. He was a gentle, humble servant of God, who helped those most in need. Miracles of healing and

exorcisms have been attributed to him. Like St. Francis of Assisi did 1000 years later, he kissed a poor leper and cured him. He's the patron saint of the Third Republic of France and many communities across Europe.



St. Frances Cabrini - Feast Day is November 13th. Also known as "Mother Cabrini," this 19th c. Italian nun came to the U.S. to work with Italian immigrants. She originally wanted to become a missionary, but instead helped Italian immigrants by establishing schools, orphanages, and hospitals. She founded the Missionary Sisters of the Sacred Heart of Jesus and established 67 institutions to serve the poor, sick, and the immigrants. She had gifts of miracles and ecstasy. In 1946, she became

the first U.S. citizen to be canonized as a saint and was a major support to her fellow Italian Immigrants. In 1950, Pope Pius XII named her as the Universal Patroness of Immigrants. Colorado was one of the states she ministered in and in 2020, this state replaced Columbus Day in October with "Cabrini Day."



St. Margaret of Scotland - Feast Day is November 16th. An 11th c. English princess born in the Kingdom of Hungary, she was also known as "Margaret of Wessex" in southern England. She married King Malcolm III of Scotland and bore 8 children, whom she raised deeply in the Catholic faith. Being a very pious and devout woman, she was known for her charity and compassion for the poor of Scotland and thus was called

"The Pearl of Scotland." She even softened the heart of her hot-tempered husband, who then became virtuous. She was a powerful example of faith in action by feeding the poor and hungry from her own table, providing hospitality to pilgrims, speaking up for those falsely accused, and working for church reforms. When she was canonized, she was recognized for her life of holiness and extraordinary virtues. She's the patron saint of Scotland.
